

Moving Mailboxes and the Body of Christ

Early in my ministry at Three Oaks, a church member complained to me because her mailbox in the church narthex had been moved. I explained that this had happened because we had received some new members into the congregation. She then suggested to me that we should "put all the new people at the end," instead of inserting them in alphabetical order among the long-term members.

Really? What kind of message would that have sent? It seems to me such an action would have communicated: "It's okay for you to join the church, but you should understand that you don't fully belong yet. Maybe after 10 or 20 years we will let you move up and mingle among the 'real' members."

Here's a little fun fact for you: of the 95 total mailboxes currently in our narthex, 48 of them weren't there 15 years ago. In other words, fully half of the people participating in our congregation today have arrived in that relatively short period of time. What kind of bizarre two-tiered class system would we have now if I had taken that "advice" back then?

Folks, shuffling mailboxes are a reason for rejoicing because they are a sign of growth. Whatever slight inconvenience is required of us to change our habits and look for our mail in a new spot, is certainly outweighed by the privilege we have of welcoming new people into our fellowship.

A couple of weeks ago we once again received some new members into our church family. During the membership service, I was struck by these words found under the heading "Commendation and Welcome": "Members of the household of God, I commend these persons to your love and care. Do all in your power to increase their faith, confirm their hope, and perfect them in love."

Quite possibly, we say these words without thinking too much about them. And if we do take a moment to ponder them, we probably are of the opinion that we are doing everything in our power to fulfill them. But I wonder...

Though I have never observed any of our members behaving rudely toward a newcomer, I have often observed our members ignoring newcomers. Even after persons have joined the church, I regularly find myself introducing these newer individuals to long-time members who have never taken the opportunity to meet them. Similarly, in conversation around the church or when passing on a prayer request, I frequently have to explain who "so and so" is – even though this person is a member of our church!

Please make sure you know our new members, so you can love them and care for them as you pledged to do on the day that they joined. Whether a person has been in our congregation for one day or for 50 years, they are no less a part of Christ's body.

Writing in the third century, the Christian apologist Tertullian noted that the pagans of that day described Christian communities this way: "See how they love one another." I would hope that the same might be said of our Three Oaks United Methodist Church: "See how they love one another."

May we embrace each new person who enters our community as a treasured brother or sister. And may your mailbox continue to move many more times in the coming years. ☺

2013 Lenten Worship Series

The River Valley Ministerial Association is sponsoring community worship services during the Lenten season. The theme this year is

“Restored in Christ.” The season of Lent is a time for us to face together the brokenness of our lives and our world, and then turn that brokenness over to Christ so that we can be restored by him through the cross. Written by seminary professor Joel Biermann, each service in this series focuses on a certain event in the Lenten story and takes a good, hard look at a broken element from that particular story. Coming to an understanding of how each of these broken elements leads to restoration in Christ is key to understanding what it ultimately means to live today as new creations in Christ.

Soup supper begins at 6:30 p.m. followed by worship at 7:15 p.m. for the next three Thursday evenings at these locations: April 3, “Broken Promises” at Sawyer Christian United Church of Christ (corner of Sawyer Rd. and Flynn Rd., Sawyer); April 10, “Broken Justice” at Three Oaks Free Methodist Church (12 E. Michigan St., Three Oaks); and April 17, Maundy Thursday, “Broken Sanctuary” will be held at our church. Our choir will sing at this service.

In addition, five of the River Valley Ministerial Association churches will be holding Good Friday services on April 18. The first of these services will be held at 12:15 p.m. at Episcopal Church of the Mediator (14280 Red Arrow Highway, Harbert). Sunday School Mission Project

Camp Catch-A-Rainbow is a camp for children ages 4 – 15 who have cancer or are in remission. This camp has been in existence for 28 years and was formerly supported by the American Cancer Society. This past year the ACS decided they could no longer fund the camp, so it has been taken over under the YMCA umbrella and is being funded through corporate and personal donations. This camp is free of charge for the campers and the camp generally serves around 100 children a year. The cost per camper is approximately \$600.00.

The campers age 4-6 enjoy a one day camp experience, while the older children are at camp for 6 days. The camp provides a wonderful respite for these children whose days are all too often filled with medical procedures, hospitals, and the constant cycle of cancer treatments. The children get to enjoy horseback riding, swimming, crafting, and many other activities, while being monitored by medical professionals to assure their health is not compromised in any way. While the camp is almost entirely staffed with volunteers who return year after year, the medical needs and special dietary needs of the children adds considerable expense.

Katie Wilson, Camp coordinator, states, “Camp gives these children a little piece of childhood back. It allows them to think in terms of their abilities instead of merely accepting their limitations. Campers gain support from one another because they have all been through similar experiences. It provides their families with a respite period as well. In my mind, that’s priceless!”

Kerri Beckett has been a volunteer camp counselor at Camp Catch-A-Rainbow for 4 years, and can’t wait to return this summer. She shares that the experience with the kids has been so inspirational and the courage that these kids display is beyond words. For the children to be able to have a normal camp experience and escape from the medical realities for a week is truly a blessing from God.

Native American Ministries Sunday

"The core of our culture, who we are, is centered around our languages. If we lose the language we lose who we are," says Native American elder to Kae Wilbert, chair, Upper New York Committee on Native American Ministries. Your gifts on Native American Ministries Sunday helps support the work of CONAM in the Upper New York area.

A century ago, many Native American children were removed from their reservations to be educated at government and church-run boarding schools. Often, they were punished for speaking their indigenous languages. By the time they returned home, many had forgotten their Native languages.

"As a result, the language skipped one or two generations," said Kae Wilbert, who chairs the Committee on Native American Ministries in the Upper New York Annual Conference. "Now there is a desperate awareness that something must be done or the spoken languages will die out."

In response to that concern, CONAM recently awarded a grant to the Seneca Hymn Singers CD Project. The grant supports the learning, rehearsing and recording of selections from the "Hymns in Seneca" songbook in order to produce CDs of that music. Part of the Iroquoian language family, Seneca is a seriously endangered language spoken in upper New York state and southern Ontario.

The hymnbook contains 150 hymns, songs and prayers in the Seneca language. The project will help preserve the Seneca language and enable people to worship in their native language.

The CD project isn't the only such effort, Wilbert said. Along with classes on reservation schools, "there are preschools where elders regularly visit and teach Seneca."
